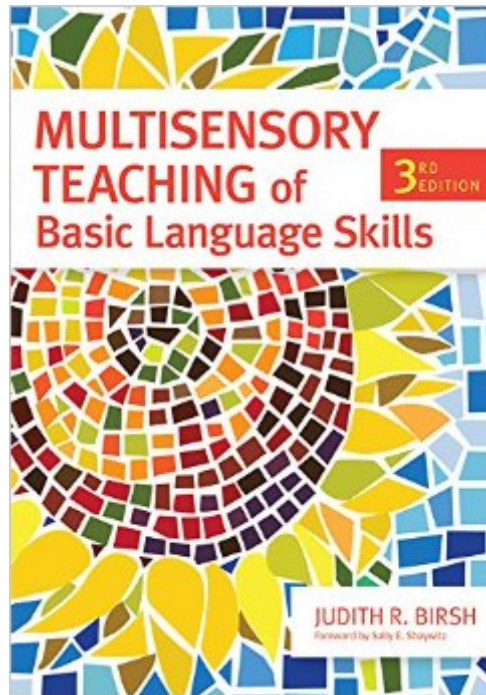

This is not a book you pick up at the store to read for pleasure. This is a book for a parent looking for answers the school doesn't have. This is a book for a classroom teacher trying to implement the new ELA common core standards. This is a book for the reading specialist in charge of making sure struggling readers can succeed on tough state assessments. This is a book for the special education teacher, whose students don't respond to instruction the way other students do. This book is for the speech therapist to help students connect oral language with the written word. This book is for every member of a student's IEP team to guarantee that students are quickly and accurately diagnosed with reading disabilities and that appropriate plans are developed to ensure success for each and every student. If this book is for you, you will find pleasure in the knowledge that you can provide the best possible programming for students who find reading unbearable.

I am a special education teacher in a district that can't afford "specialists" so I had to try to learn as much about reading as I could to try to help my students. I was expecting multi-sensory to involve more movement. The kinesthetic element refers to the movement of the jaw when pronouncing various phonemes. The book is 600+ pages and I read all but the two chapters that didn't readily apply to me in my middle school setting. The principles explained in this book that I've used so far have been helpful and effective.

The depth and breadth of information contained in these pages is guaranteed to alter the practices of even the most veteran teachers. Teachers will learn the specifics for incorporating multisensory teaching into their daily routines. Explicit examples make the strategies easy to use in the classroom. The immediate payoff is evident in increased student learning. This should be a

requirement for any preservice teacher and those who have been in the field for a while.

I ordered this book because it was a required text book for one of my M.Ed. Reading classes. I found this book to be very helpful and full of easily applicable information. Several of the chapter have specific activities that promote essential skills in fun and engaging ways. All the information in this book is well researched and proven methods that promote language skills in learning. Also, the multisensory aspect ensures that students are learning in a way that is easy for them to remember. I plan on keeping this text book next to my desk as I plan lesson because it is a valuable tool to make sure I am planning effective literacy instruction.

This book is meaty. If you love scads of research, in depth scholarly writing and detailed processes of how to teach reading to the struggling student then this book is for you! If you are a parent just starting to research dyslexia, I would not recommend this book to start because it is so large and assumes readers already come with a fair amount of background knowledge. I would start with *Overcoming Dyslexia* by Shaywitz (a contributor to this text) and *The Dyslexic Advantage*- These are also available through audible audio books on . But this book is a must for classroom language arts teachers seeking to broaden their knowledge of language based learning disabilities and how to fix them in the classroom. Each chapter is written by a different expert in the field and gives this text flavor that most scholarly books lack. My copy is heavily highlighted!

This is an excellent textbook for anyone wishing to know more about evidence-based, strategic instruction for dyslexia remediation. The chapters are written by several researchers and master instructors who are top in the field. It is a college level textbook, however, so be forewarned that it is rather content-dense reading. I have trained in this field for over 20 years and still use it as a reference and a refresher course.

I am studying for a Masters of Special Education and have found this to be an invaluable and comprehensive resource. It lists great activities to put theory into practice in the classroom.

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
